Cornelius [sic] Coakley, a prominent farmer living about four miles south of Whitesville, was found dead in a corn field on his farm Tuesday evening by his son Jerry.

Mr. Coakley was a sufferer for many years from heart disease and this was the cause of his death. Coroner Beaver, of Amazonia, was notified and went up Wednesday morning, but decided an inquest was unnecessary.

Deceased was seventy years of age. He was born in Ireland and at the age of twenty years came to America. He stayed in New York a short time, moving from there to Iowa, where he remained until he came to Andrew county. He leaves a wife and six children and two grandchildren. All the children, except a son who is in Idaho, were at the funeral.

The funeral took place Thursday, the body was brought here on the noon train and interred in the Savannah cemetery.

Mrs. Lue Cobb, age 67, residence Amazonia. Alfred Cobb, age 2 years, Brimson, Mo.

Too much speed at a turn in the road caused a Dodge touring car, driven by Everett Lisle, a fifteen [sic] youth of Amazonia, to leave the track and turn over two or more time, resulting in two deaths and the injury of three other persons. The accident occured [sic] at 8:15 p.m., at a sharp turn in the road, about a mile and a half west of Amazonia.

Mrs. Lue Cobb suffered a broken neck and other injuries, and lived about one hour. The two year old child died from a fractured skull several hours after reaching Ensworth Hospital in St. Joseph. Mrs. J. P. Cobb, mother of the child, who was thought to be dangerously bruised, was also rushed to the hospital but recovered so rapidly she was discharged the following day.

The other injured were Everett Lisle, right arm broken, severe cuts and bruises and internal injuries, Will recover. George Graves, slightly bruised.

Mrs. J. P. Cobb and four children came from their home at Brimson, near Trenton, to visit her mother, Mrs. Turner, and her mother-in-law, Mrs. Lue Cobb, who lost her life in the accident. Two of the four Cobb children escaped with very slight injuries.

The car was wrecked almost to the point of complete destruction.

January 3rd, 1898, she was united in marriage to O. V. Sells by Rev. J. B. Kearby. To this union five children were born; four sons, Vincent Amos, Harold Franklin, Raymond Hartley, O. V. Jr., and one daughter Margaret Alice.

In the going of such a young and useful life, it is hard for us to understand the dealings of a loving God who never errs or deals unkindly. But we bow our heads in humble submission to our Father's will and say not our will but thine be done.

Sister Sells had many friends who remain at the gate to weep, while she enjoys the pleasure and glory of her Heavenly Father's house. Among them are her devoted husband and children, her mother, brothers and sisters and several nieces and nephews.

Deceased was born in Dorsetshire, England, March 23, 1824. He was united in marriage to Harriet Brand in 1857 [sic]; this union was blest with thirteen children, eight daughters and five sons, all of whom are living. Owing to reverse of fortunes, he left England in 1874, coming to American, locating at Savannah among strangers and without means to establish a business. The future was dark and would have discouraged a less determined spirit. But the love for those he had left in the old English home spurred him on until success crowned his efforts. In the short space of two years he had saved enough to send for his family. His life was one of self sacrifice and devotion to his family. Toward his fellow men he was a strict followe of the Golden Rule. It might be said of him as was said of one of the Presidents: 'If his soul was turned inside out not a spot would be found upon it.' Death had no terrors for such a man. Though a kind husband and father has been taken, the separation is not for long. He has entered into the joys of the Lord, awaiting the coming of those he left behind. The funeral sermon was preached by Elder J. B. Kearby at the Christian church in Savannah, the body was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery in that city, where it awaits the resurrection morn.

'The body of C. R. Cobb, a driver for the Hiawatha-Holstein Dairy company of Spokane, was found frozen in the snow some 17 miles from Orient, Ferry county, Monday afternoon by one of several searching parties which had been looking for him since last Thursday.

'Cobb left Spokane for Orient a week ago Monday on a week's vacation to hunt deer. He went Tuesday to a trapper's cabin, 16 miles back in the hills, and the next day when he left the cabin he told the trapper that he would be back that night. When he did not return the trapper became alarmed and spent several hours looking for him. Searching parties were organized.

'The body was taken to Orient yesterday, and will be brought to Spokane today. As shown by the trail, Cobb fell down a 50-foot bank, and apparently was so crippled that he could not walk. Nevertheless, he managed to crawl about a half mile, or perhaps a third of the way back to the cabin, before he was overcome by the cold.

'Cobb was about 30 years old, and is survived by his widow and three children living at E601 Ninth avenue. He had been in the employ of Hiawatha-Holstein company for a year and four months.

"He was a conscientious, dependable man, and liked by all," said R. E. Harris, milk wagon supervisor, last night.'

Cobb was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Elisha Cobb, who live on the Second street road, north of the city. He was born an reared in St. Joseph and attended Central High School. He is survived by his widow and three children. His wife was Miss Flora Mathis of St. Joseph. Burial was in

Spokane. Cobb left St. Joseph six years ago and at the time of his death he was employed by a dairy company in Spokane.

Columbus F. Cobb was born September 3, 1852 [sic], in Andrew county, Missouri, about three miles west of Savannah, and died at his home in the west part of town Sunday morning, February 18, 1923, at 9:30 o'clock. At the time of his death he was 70 years old, 5 mnths and 15 days old. He had never lived outside of Andrew county. On October 14, 1875, he was married to Miss Jennie Terrell, also of Andrew county. They were married on the Monahan farm one and a half miles southwest of Savannah. Four sons were born to them as follows: Bert E., Emmett F., Otha M., of near Amazonia, and Ralph D. of near Savannah.

A number of years ago Mr. Cobb professed faith in Christ and was baptised [sic<sup>3</sup>] by Rev. Minter of the Episcopal church of Amazonia, but was never confirmed and taken into the church.

For many years he had been a sufferer from asthma and last Tuesday he was stricken with a deep cold which soon developed into pneumonia of a virulent form. Almost to the last however, he refused to take his bed. Saturday it became apparent that hope was no loner [sic] possible and at 9:30 Sunday the messenger came. He had only six days of illness. Besides his wife and four sons already mentioned he is survived by two sisters, Mrs. A. R. King and Mrs. Peter Christianson, both of Savannah, and by four grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted at the First Christian Church, Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock with address by the pastor<sup>4</sup>. Burial in Savannah cemetery.

Surviving Mrs. Graham are five sons and one daughter and several grandchildren. Three sons George, John and Otis, reside in North Dakota; Howards [sic] in Idaho, William in New Mexico. The daughter, Mrs. Breit, lives near Guilford, Mo.

Mrs. Graham was at no time in her life possessed of a strong body, but was, from childhood, more or less physically frail, and during her 65 years, passed through many serges [sic] of serious sickness by which one with less determined will and less undangtable [sic] courage and less childlike faith in the Power and goodness of God, might readily have been overcome. But she was a brace soul and fought back the frailties of the body with that courage and hope and confidence which come from a loving trust in the living God.

Early in childhood she gave her heart to God, united with the Methodist Church, and, amid sickness, sorrow, cares, burdens and motherly responsibilities, she lived a life of beauty and faithfulness. Even in her childhood sin was an unsightly thing, and it pained her heart to see others do wrong. Her fixed faith in God, her tenderness of heart, her goodness or soul, her purity of life, her love and care and gentleness towards children, grandchildren, husband, neighbors and friends, all go to make up an example worthy and safe to follow. No fitter soul ever made the exchange of earth for heaven.

Saturday morning about 9 o'clock the team of mules hitched to the ice wagon ran away on the hill a short distance east of Savannah and killed almost instantly V. A. Cobb who had been in the ice business in Savannah for twenty-five years.

Mr. Cobb usually remained at the farm two miles east of town where the ice is stored but Saturday morning he decided that he would come to town and go to St. Joseph and order some ice. So he started to town on the load of ice with one of the workmen, Walter Holland. The mules became frightened at a truck standing on the first hill after turning west. The mules ran and the neckyoke came down. Mr. Cobb was holding one line and was jerked off the wagon, which ran

over him just below the shoulders and across one arm. Walter was thrown from the seat and he managed to catch and holt to the wagon with one arm until he could jump. He ran immediately to Mr. Cobb who was lying on his fae. He turned Mr. Cobb over and fanned him but he was unconscious and breathed only two or three times.

Walter called to Frank Ewell who was at the foot of the hill driving a truck, and he come [sic] and the body was brought to town. Walter and his father M. E. Holland have been assisting Mr. Cobb in the ice business several years. Mr. Cobb had been in the ice business in Savannah and Maryville for thirty-five years.

Memorial services were held at the First Baptist church Tuesday afternoon with one of the largest attendance of any funeral services ever held there. Members of the Masonic order were present from St. Joseph and other towns and there was a large body of them present. They gave their burial rites at the cemetery. Burial was in the Savannah cemetery.

<sup>6</sup>Vincent Amos Brand Cobb was born in Dorsetshire, England, September 8, 1869. With his parents he came to Andrew county in 1874 and located on the old homestead about one and a half miles northeast of Savannah. He was one of thirteen children, and the first of the family to pass to the Great Beyond with the exception of the father, who died May 16, 1894.

He has resided in and near Savannah all his life except about six years spent at Maryville. Vincent never married, but since the death of his father has made his home with his mother and sister.

M. in 1899./ He was a member of Savannah Chapter No. 83 Royal Arch Masons, Savannah Chapter No. 223 Order of the Eastern Star, St. Joseph, DePaynes Commandery No. 4, St. Joseph; Moila Temple Order of the Mystic Shrine, St. Joseph.

[He was called to his reward on Saturday, June 14, 1919.] Vincent was a man among men. He was modest and unassuming, kind and charitable. He will be greatly missed in fraternal circles, in the council of his church and in the community at large.

At the age of 16 he came with his parents to Andrew county, Missouri and settled on a farm five miles west of Savannah, which his father homesteaded in 1844. He was married to Mary A. than most dolls, an infinitesmal [sic] mite of humanity, little Florence Virginia Cole, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Cole of the Oakland addition, is a normal baby in everything except size. She weighed but one and one-half pounds at birth. Though already eight weeks old Florence weighs only two and one-half pounds, barely a pound more than she did at birth. She is but fifteen inches high and her hands and feet are so tiny that an ordinary finger ring can easily be slipped over her wrist and ankle. Everything about the tiny mite is on a liliputian [sic] scale. A tiny doll's feeding bottle is used to give her milk and a tablespoon is, for her, a meal. She is dressed in the smallest size doll's clothing obtainable. In respect to her size her proportions are those of any normal baby, though her fingers look like tiny twigs and her toes are so small they can hardly be seen. When Florence was born, Dr. M. L. Briscoe, who had charge of the case, believed it impossible for her to live, as in all his experience he had never seen so small a baby. Even after she had been alive for several days it seemed impossible that such a tiny mite could survive and little hope was given to her anxious parents. The baby's dimensions at birth were as follows: Full length, 12 1/2 inches; circumference of head, 9 inches; chest, 6 inches; ankle, 2 inches; wrist, 1 3/4 inches; length of arm, 3 1/2 inches; length of leg, 5 inches.'

Dr. Josiah Coleman was born in Lafayette county, Pennsylvania, in November, 1816 and died in Cherryvale, Kansas, June 2, 1898.

At the age of ten years he lost his father by death and was obliged to make his own way in life, and at the age of 18 years engaged in teaching school. In 1851 he removed to Bloomfield, Illinois, where he engaged in merchandising and at the same time studied medicine. In 1855 he removed to Nodaway county, Missouri, and engaged in the practice of medicine. During his residence in Missouri he was twice elected and served his district in the legislature. During the war he engaged in organizing troops for the defense of the Union and led them to the field, bearing the rank successively of captain, major and colonel. During the days of reconstruction, subsequent to the war he rendered valuable assistance to the government. Being a man of great determination and unflinching loyalty he rested not until the Federal authority was fully reestablished and obeyed. In 1872 he removed to Coffeyville, Kansas, and in 1873 located at Liberty and a few years ago removed to Cherryvale. In the many years of his practice of medicine he was most devoted to his profession, never hesitating to sacrifice his own personal comfort to give unremitting attention to his patients. Ambitious to succeed in his chosen profession and the tenderest regard for the well being of his patients entailed exposure which brought on rheumatism which caused him great suffering in later years. He was married three times, two of his wives having died and the third remains his widow. He was the father of 22 children, 16 of whom survive and 14 were present at his funeral. The funeral took place on Friday, June 3, at the Baptist church in Cherryvale, Rev. A. M. barker officiating and the burial was in Liberty cemetery, Hackleman post G.A.R. and other old soldiers acting as escort to the remains.

Dr. Coleman was a man of more than ordinary mental force, tenacious of his opinions and courageous in expressing them. He tried to find out what was right and having made up his mind he was as firm as a rock. In the days of his full strength of mind and body he was a valuable man to any community.

Not amid the sound of battle, Not struck down by bursting shell, But in the arms of those who loved him, There the grand old hero fell.

Fell into eternal slumber, Into painless, perfect rest; The nerveless hands in peace are folded, No pulse stirs the silent breast.

'Seldom has the community been so stirred as it was on Monday when the passing on of Mrs. Sheldon E. Davis, the wife of President Davis of the Montana State Normal College became generally known. Although it is less than a year since Mrs. Davis accompanied her husband to Dillon to establish a new home, she had within that short time made an enviable place for herself in the community through her genuine interest in every phase of our common life. The influence of personality is not to be measured by calendar months. Mrs. Davis has left an enduring impression; the memory of her gracious life, rich in service, sympathy, and faith, will remain to quicken and inspire, to become a part of that store of choice memories cherished by every community.

'When the influenza epidemic swept through the country last year, the dread disease attacked Mrs. Davis, then living at Maryville, Mo., and so affected her general health as to make a change

of climate advisable. The marked improvement that resulted proved illusory, however. More than two months ago a gradual decline began that terminated fatally on Sunday, July 18 Mrs. C. W. Aydelotte of Kansas City, a sister of Mrs. Davis, arrived in time to be with her during the last days.

'All exercises were suspended at the Normal college on Tuesday afternoon when the funeral services were held at the St. James Episcopal Church, with Reverend Thomas W. Bennett officiating. Members of the college faculty, Vice-president E. R. Mosher, Professors Robert Clark, Lee R. Light, F. H. Garver, J. B. Cluley and C. G. Manning acted as pallbearers. Dean J. M. Hamilton of the Montana State College of agriculture and mechanic arts, was in attendance as the representative of the University of Montana institutions. Interment was made at Mountain View Cemetery.

'Mary Coleman Davis was born in Jefferson City, Missouri, on September 28, 1886. She grew to womanhood in Warrensburg, Mo., graduating from the Warrensburg St. Normal school in due time. An ambitious student, full of promise and eager to achieve, she continued her college education at the Universities of Chicago, Michigan and Colorado. Prior to this, however, she had spent some time at the Knox College of Music (Galesburg, Illinoi). For three years she was a member of the faculty in the Warrensburg State Normal School, working in the department of English. In 1911 she was married to Dr. Sheldon Emmon Davis. Two children were born to this union, Ethel Jean, aged seven, who survives her mother, and Harland Coleman, who died at the age of one year. Mrs. Davis came to Dillon September 1, 1919, when Dr. Davis assume the presidency of the State Normal College.

'It was in her home that Mrs. Davis' type of true womanliness found her greatest happiness. Her family, her church, her friends, her books, and her music-- these constituted the supreme elements of her life. The broad range of her interests and sympathies, however, led her to identify herself with various local organizations, and in each she became a valued member. A woman of superior and varied endowments, she was eagerly welcomed and accorded immediate recognition while her sincerity, her ready sympathy and spirit of helpfulness made friends of all who knew her. It is a profound sense of personal loss that all such feel today.'

The inquest was held in this city Monday over the body of Harry Collins, which was found lying near the Chicago Great Western tracks below Dean by Mr. Lewis, near there, Saturday morning. No verdict was arrived at and the remains were shipped to his home at Patterson, Iowa, for interment. A neighbor of Collins' mother came and identified the body.

The body was identified by letters from his mother and brothers which spoke of his returning home from Kansas City, where he had been employed for some time. Besides the letters there was \$8.15 in his pockets. The entire body was bruised, a long gash on the head, the chest crushed

and left arm severed near the shoulder and crushed to a pulp. The cloth in the sleeve of the coat was mashed into the flesh, but there was no blood on the garment. Neither was there any blood on the track nor could the train men find blood on the engines and none of the man's bones were broken, as they must have been had he been run down by the engine. So the coroner' just could not decide whether Collins, who was about 25 years old, had been killed before being placed on the track, as no blood being found anywhere and the deep gash in the head by a blunt instrument indicated.

There was nothing to indicate that the body had been dragged to the point where found. Many who viewed the body before its removal to Savannah are of the opinion that the man fell from a train between two cars and was crushed to death. The hole in the right temple could have been created by the bolts of nuts in the end of a box car, so railroad men say. A northbound freight train passed over the road about 10 o'clock Friday night and the generally accept theory is that Collins was killed by this train. If his money had been missing and the letters which disclosed his identity had been taken from his pockets, the murder theory would have found more general belief.

E. N. McMillan, a nightwatchman employed at the Maple Leaf elevator in North St. Joseph, said that he saw a man about Collins' height and build standing on a box car in a northbound freight train that pulled out of the Chicago Great Western yards about 10 o'clock Friday night. McMillan thinks the man had been given the privilege of riding out of town on the train, as he was talking with the head brakeman at the time.

At the Chicago Great Western car yards in this city on Sunday Sheriff Gamble arrested on suspicion a man who gave his name as Bolick Justus and said he was a Hungarian miner from Colorado on his way to Waterloo, Iowa. The man has two very 'black eyes,' caused by bruises, and is being held here for further developments. Justus declares he had never seen Collins.

The Coroner's jury adjourned until Saturday.

Saturday morning about 6:30 o'clock Nolin Sewis [sic] Jr., a boy about 15 years old, saw the body of a dead man lying on the Great Western tracks below the overhead bridge, about 4 miles north of St. Joseph. Neighbors were at once notified and Coroner Myers at Rea, and Sheriff Gamble and Pros. Att'y Pyle at Savannah, were summoned.

The body lay face downward near the east rail, with the head toward the south. The left arm had been severed near the shoulder by one of the night trains, and [lay?] close to and east of the rail. The right arm was broken and crushed but not severed. The forehead rested on a railroad tie and the breast had been crushed in on another by the train which cut the arm off. The clothing had been torn from the hips and the back was bruised and scratched. The body had not been dragged.

The body was that of a young man, rother [sic] tall, weighing perhaps 165 pounds. The clothing was good and contained \$8 in money and some letters addressed to H. E. Collins, Kansas City

Mo. The letters were from the mother, sister and brother of the dead man, from Patterson Ia., and communication with that place soon established his identity.

The body was moved from the track to permit the passage of the northbound local freight, and about noon the coroner arrived and took charge.

Constable F. M. Carter of Jefferson Tp., impanneled [sic] a jury and an investigation of the surroundings was made. There was no blood where the body was found except a little under the face. The hate was found about twenty yards north of the body.

The body was brought to Terhune's undertaking rooms Saturday and Monday Coroner Myers performed an autopsy in the presence of the jury which was composed of J. T. Norman, Fritz Beeler, Joseph Sickles, W. S. Crowley, Phil McKinley and J. F. Wilcox.

After hearing several witnesses Monday afternoon, Coroner Myers dismissed the jury until next Saturday at 2 o'clock. Nothing of interest developed in this evidence beyond the finding of the body.

Saturday evening Bolik Justus, a Pole, was arrested by Sheriff Gamble on suspicion of knowing something of the killing which the authorities declare to be a murder. He was taken to jail and closely questioned but as he has or pretended to have a very limited knowledge of English, no satisfaction could be gained from him, but his stories were very contradictory. When arrested he had two very black eyes which he said he received in a fight in Kansas City. He carries a union miners card. Justus was seen in the neighborhood of the place where the body was found, going south. He passed the place where the body lay surrounded by those who first discovered it, Saturday morning but did not stop even when spoken to. He came on to town and was arrested north of town on the railroad Saturday evening.

The autopsy revealed three wounds in the back of the skull, and a gash across the back of the head at the crown, and were evidently inflicted with a blunt instrument, wielded with great force.

The theory of the state is that Collins was murdered and the body laid on the track afterward. They are now looking for another man said to have been with Collins when he left Kansas City.

The circumstances surrounding Justus's arrival here together with the conflicting stories he tells, and an evident reluctance to talk, see to fully justify the authorities in holding him for investigation.

He conducted a grocery store at 625 South Eighth street for twenty-five years. He had been conducting the Woodland Hotel for two years. Mr. Laughlin published, last week, an article exposing the treasonable designs of the Freesoilers of the Territory, and out of this the difficulty grew. The whirlwind has not yet passed over Kansas.-- (St. Joseph Cycle 2d.

Two years ago Mr. Collins had undergone a severe operation for the removal of a cancer from the nose. Recently he had suffered with a pain in his forehead, and fearing a recurrence of his former trouble, he went to Savannah, Missouri, to consult his surgeons. They decided that te pain in the forehead came from the exposed nerve in the nose and advised that grafting new skin on the nose would relieve this trouble. This was done very successfully but almost immediately erysipelas set in. His wife and two daughters of Creighton were called to his bedside and assisted in seeing that everything possible was done for him but the disease could not be stayed.

Accompanied by the sorrowing family, the remains were brought to North Bend. Funeral services were held from the Methodist church Sunday afternoon at two o'clock and interment was made in Woodlawn cemetery beside his first wife. Rev. E. A. Smith of Purple Cane had charge of the services. Pall bearers were Charles Harris and Frank Harris of Fremont, Arthur Napier of North Bend, Harry Butterfield, Jasper Stormer and R. Hook of Dodge.

Sanford W. Collins was born near Sharon, New York, January 25, 1871. He moved with his parents to North Bend in 1888 and was married here to Lillie M. Snyder, January 1, 1895. To this union five children were born: Harvey and Reuben Collins, Elsie Collins Tenney and Mary Collins Strope; Dorothy passed away in early childhood. Mr. and Collins spent several years on a farm near Silver Creek, but returned to North Bend and lived in this vicinity for several years before the family removed to Creighton in 1911 where they have since resided. In June, 1912, he mourned the loss of his wife, Lillie. October 27, 1915, he was married to Maggie Butterfield who survives him with the four children and three step-children, Orville and Elmer Butterfield, and Alice Montgomery, all of Creighton.

He is also survived by two brothers, Warren of Canajoharie, New York, and John of Fremont. In addition to all of the immediate family who were here to attend the funeral others were Mr. and Mrs. John Kent of Omaha, Mr. and Mrs. John Collins of Fremont, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Burch, Mr. and Mrs. James Harris, Harry Butterfield and Mrs. Jane Butterfield, all of Dodge.

Mr. Collins belonged to a pioneer family of North Bend and possessed many of the traits which through their long lives endearer his father and mother to the residents of this community. He was a hard worker but always found time for neighborly acts of kindness. He was devoted to his family and his children remember with tenderness their childhood when he was both father and mother to them, and the later years when he was a helpful counsellor to all of his family. Even in the last days of his severe suffering t Savannah, in his conscious moments his thoughts were entirely for those he was leaving. He will be greatly missed, not only by the wife and children, but by those farther from the family circle in whom he was kindly interested.

His death was quite unexpected to us all, and a great shock to his family, as he had been seemingly much improved for a few days. I suppose it was a bronchial and pulmony [sic] affection that caused his death. For the benefit of his friends, I will give you a short obituary. Wm. Colville was born in Ayrshire, Scotland, June 11, 1828. He was, therefore, fifty years old when he died. He was married to Margaret Gibson, who survives him, on the 24th anniversary of his birthy, June 11, 1852. He removed to this country in 1855, and located in Waukesha county, Wisconsin, where he resided ten years. He then removed to Missouri, to the farm where he died, and where he spent thirteen years of his life. He united with the established Presbyterian Church of Ayrshire, Scotland, when seventeen years of age. While in Wisconsin, he was a member of the United Presbyterian Church at Lisbon, Waukesha county. After his removal to Missouri, he connected with the Union Presbyterian Church of Empire Prairie, of which his wife, daughter and three sons are members. Thus he was for thirty-three years a faithful member of the church of his fathers, one branch of the church visible, from which he has graduated to full communion in the church triumphant-- the Church in heaven. His death was emphatically a Christian death. He gently and peacefully fell asleep in Jesus. During his sickness no murmur escaped his lips; his patience was marked, and he frequently said: 'I am so happy.' Toward the last, his mind was entirely weaned away from earthly things, and the principal topics of his conversation were the church, Jesus and heaven. Mr. Comer proposed to go down after it. He placed his foot in a loop and when he had decended [sic] about forty feet he called to be pulled up. The rope which was operated by horse-power, was started up. When he was about sixteen feet from the top it was noticed that the horse was unable to raise him any farther. On calling to him no reply was received.

Parties were notified and inside of an hour, hundreds of people had gathered to the scene of the accident. Willing hands plied the spades and in a few hours the body was reached.

The tiling was about eighteen inches in diameter, and he had caught on the side of the well and his foot was drawn upwards past his head and he was wedged in tight. Life was extinct when he was reached.

It is supposed that he was overcome with "damps" and fainted, and when he reached the top of the tiling, which was sixteen feet below the surface of the ground, his body instead of sliding as it did in the tiling, stuck to the earthen wall of the well, resulting as above stated, in crushing him to death.

He leaves a wife and four children who have the sympathy of every one in this awful calamity which has befallen them.

Mound City, Mo., Jun 10-- Yesterday morning, while Henry Comer and his partner in the well-boring business were removing the tiling from a 110 foot well on John W. Pew's place one and one-half miles southeast of this city, the former met death. The men had removed about fifty feet of the tiling when a broken one lodged about eighteen feet from the top. Mr. Comer placed his left foot in a loop of the rope and was being lowered to remove the obstruction. When down about fifteen feet he called to be drawn up. The machine was reversed but when the rope tightened more than a man's weight would warrant, it was stopped. The men looked into the well and discovered that Comer was dead. He was doubled up in such a manner that it was impossible to draw him up and it was necessary to dig down to where he was lodged in order to release the body. The coroner, F. O. Davis of Bigelow, was sent for. On hearing the statement of Mr. Hagerman, Comer's partner, and of Mr. Pew, for whom they were working, the coroner decided that there was no necessity for an inquest. The supposition is that Comer died instantly from damps. Comer was the son-in-law of James Judy and lived about eleven miles northwest of this city. He leaves a wife and four small children.

Thelbert William Conrad, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Conrad, was born at Gaynor City, Mo., July 3, 1882.

He lived at the place of his birth until twelve years of age when he removed with his parents to Parnell, Mo., where he resided until the time of his death, Feb. 18, 1908. On Feb. 1 he contracted pneumonia. His friends thought his robust health and normal strength would tide him safely through. On the afternoon of his death he rested quietly and the family and friends felt encouraged, but his very strength and fortitude hid his real condition. The end came without warning at 6:30 p.m., Tuesday, Feb. 18. Seldom has the community had a greater shock than that occasioned by his death. Rev. W. T. Conwell, of the Missouri Annual Conference, M. E. Church, South, son of Thomas Jefferson and Margaret A. Conwell, was born near Hazlegreen, Morgan county, Ky., Feb'y 19th 1849, and died in Savannah, Mo., at 12:27 p.m., May 23, 1881, of malignant dyspepsia, as shown by a post mortem examination made at his own request. To the writer but little is known of his early history. At about the age of sixteen he went to Ohio, and for two years attended at Lebanon, Holbrook University, graduated in some departments, after which he served a clerkship in that town for two years.

In 170 he came to Rocheport, Boone county, Mo., and spent four years in that and Calaway counties, teaching school and reading law. In March, 1874, he was converted at Smith's school house, Boone county, Mo., under the ministry of Rev. L. A. Smith, of the Missouri Conference, whose son-in-law he afterwards became.

Soon as he became a member of the church he was elected Sunday School Superintendenat, which office he held until Fall.

In the meantime he was licensed to preach and recommended to the traveling connection Rev. W. M. Newland, P. E. Conference was held at St. Joseph and he was received on trial, and appointed junior preacher with Rev. T. R. Hedgpeth on the Maryville circuit. On November 26th

of this year he married Miss Fannie Smith, of Columbia, Mo., who, to him proved to be a help mate indeed. The year seems to have been one of great embarrassment; as an item illustrative of this he did not pass on the course the first year because he was not able to buy the books required to be read.

The next year he was sent to Alanthus Grove Mission, and there he proved himself an efficient workman, organizing several new societies and receiving more than a hundred members during the year. It was at the close of this conference year, that as a class-mate, I met the subject of this notice and formed an acquaintance, that deepened with friendship and love more and more at our every meeting as we came from study and labor to the examination room. He was returned to the same mission the next year and served very acceptably, and at its close was by the late Bishop Marvin, ordained a deacon and appointed to Albany circuit where he was acceptable and successful. At the end of the year Albany was made a station and he was returned. During the spring of this year he had the typhoid fever, when, perhaps, the seeds of that disease that followed and so early brought him to the grave, were sown. The following Fall at Louisiana, Mo., he was ordained by Bishop Wightman, an elder, and appointed to the charge which he has since been serving, to the profit of our cause and the pleasure of his people. As a husband, he was ever thoughtful, kind, and affectionate; as a man he was loved by all. The reason for this is apparant [sic] to all who knew him. His physical weakness awakened sympathy and opened a door in the heart of all he met. His conversational powers were good, and were even in use in private and in public, among the old and among the young. No pride when he was with the poor and lowly, nor timidity when with the rich, and exalted, still his tongue. He ever seemed blind to the weakness and errors of men, and in every man saw something great or good. The passive virtues appeared very bright in his character for while he seemed mild and easy almost to failing, underneath there was an indomitable will and decision of character that made him safe and reliable-- a monument of strength. As a pastor he lacked in some degree that system, regularity and energy which some possess. This is to be accounted for on the ground of his poor health and studious habits. I think my classmates will bear me out in the assertion that he stood as one of the first in the class. As a preacher he had ability of a high order. I have no doubt that had health and long life been granted to him, he would have attained an enviable reputation. His mind was metaphysical. His discourses were logical and evinced thorough analysis and synthesis. His appeals were for the most part made to the judgement. He was theoretical rather than practical. He was noted for concentration, sometimes losing sight of everything else except the specific thing upon which his mind was fixed.

As a Christian he was modest and unpretentious, yet settled and positive. His ease is described correctly in the language, 'The path of the just is as the shining light, that shineth more and more unto the perfect day.' To me a few days before his death he said, 'one main object of my life has been to accumulate knowledge and when I was nearly over,' referring to a sinking spell he had, 'I desired to go where I could learn more rapidly.' He lived well and died well. Shortly before he died he said, 'I am dying and I do not want you to grieve for me when I am gone,' and perhaps anxious about his dear wife's future, and conscious of her tenacious hold upon him he said, 'don't keep me back Fannie.' He took her hand in his and pressed it firmly and said, 'Dear I will have to leave you.' She asked him if he had any message to send to his father. He said, 'Tell him I died in great peace.' Thus he neared the gate of death and shouted 'Glory! Glory!' several times shortly before he passed into eternity.

About four years ago when in poor health, he requested me to write his life, a task I would cheerfully undertake were it practicable-- and were it done by one competent, would neither be uninteresting nor unprofitable; but as I desire nothing of that kind, in tender and grateful remembrance, I may be permitted to record this tribute of respect and devotion to my departed friend, class mate, and brother in church. His last sermon was preached at Savannah eight days before his death, from the text, 'A word fitly spoken is like apples of gold in pictures of siler,' and from the same pulpit his funeral was preached by Rev. C. I. Vandeventer from II Tim. 4:7, 8 verses: 'I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith:

[']Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me on that day and not to me only, but until all them also that love his appearing.'

After services at the church, a large concourse of relatives and friends followed the remains to the cemetery, all the ministers of Savannah being present.

He never denied his conversion, but always manifested his confidence in the Christ whom he believed and trusted. He expressed himself as being ready to go and said to his family, 'Meet me in Heaven.' 'Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord, from henceforth, yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors; and their works do follow them.'

At. 2<sup>16</sup> o'clock p.m. Sunday, April 5, there were interred in the Fairview cemetery, five miles north of Savannah, the mortal remains of one who for the last twenty years has held the distinction of being the oldest resident of Andrew county.

In 1838 there emigrated from Indiana to the then far west, four young married men, whose wives were sisters. The names of these men were Elijah M. Smith, Henry Foster, Ralph Dixon and Noah Garren. The maiden name of their wives was Copple. These four families, with three others, constituted at the time the entire population of the territory that is now Andrew county. The hardships and deprivations that these sturdy pioneers underwent, we who are enjoying the fruit of their labors will never know. They secured, each, a tract of land-- that same land which today is ready sale at prices ranging all the way from \$50 to \$100 per acre-- this land they bought from the U. S. government, under the administration of James K. Polk.<sup>17</sup>

One by one, during the sixty-five years that have come and gone, these persons have relinquished their hold upon, not only their land, but upon all earthly things, and passed into the presence of Him who created the land and all things. The last to pass away was Susannah, the wife of Elijah M. Smith; he having died Aug. 26, 1860. She was the mother of six boys and six girls. Those living are Joseph D., William, George, Mrs. J. C. Goforth, Mrs. Sanford Rhoades, and Mrs. Thos. Simpson, all of Nodaway county, Jno. C. who resides on the old homestead, five miles northwest of Savannah, and Mrs. Robert Hopecraft of Cumberland, Maryland. She had 58 grandchildren, 100 great-grandchildren, and 2 great-great-grandchildren. She was born in Indiana, Jan. 15, 1816, obeyed the Gospel of Christ in 1849 or 1850, and lived a devoted Christian to the end.

A large number of persons attended the funeral services, which were conducted by her pastor, Eld. W. A. Chapman, at the Fairview Church, of which she was a charter member, and from which she was only dismissed by death. Truly a mother in Israel has fallen asleep,-- 'Asleep in Jesus! From which one never wakes to weep.'

Again we have had a verification of the adage, 'In the midst of life we are in death.' Sunday, Sept. 9, Eli Cornelison ate his noon meal as usual and seemed in perfect health, and in his usual good spirits. Having previously arranged to be one of a party to go to Barnard on a hand car, they started soon after dinner, and all went well until upon reaching a point about a mile from town 'Bud,' as he was familiarly called, ceased 'pumping' at the car, sank down, and fell to the ground. As soon as the car could be stopped, those on board hurried to the prostrate form, when to their dismay he was found to be dead. The body was brought back to town, physicians examined it and decided that death resulted from apoplexy.

The deceased was born near Richmond, Kentucky, December 28, 1848, brought by his parents to Andrew county in 1849, and except a short time spent in Kansas, has lived here every [sic] since, and for the last 23 years has lived in Rosendale. When he was nine years old his mother died and he was brought up by a half sister, the late Mrs. Dr. Ward. He had no full brothers or sisters, but had a half brother and three half sisters, all of whom have died except one sister.

On Sept. 1, 1872, he was married to Miss Isabel Cooper. Three daughters were born to them, all of whom, with their mother, survive him. They are Mrs. William Colburn, of Stockton, Ks., Mrs. R. D. Curran, of Centerville, Ia., and Mrs. J. W. Todd, of Rosendale. In 1892 he obeyed the Gospel and became a member of the Church of Christ, being baptized by the writer. Aug. 28, 1886 he was initiated into the mysteries of the Oddfellowship, and at the time of his death was Vice Grand of the Rosendale lodge.

After an intimate acquaintance with him extending over a period of twentyone years the writer can say that Bud Cornelison was a man of sterling integrity, scrupulously honest, an obliging neighbor, a kind husband and father-- a good man.

A. B. Cornell, a veteran newspaper man, died at his home near Alton, Mo., May 19, aged 76 years. Mr. Cornell published the Maryville, Mo., Journal, in the latter '60s.-- Pointers.

A. B. Cornell published the Maryville Journal during the great campaign of 1870, when B. Gratz Brown broke away from the radical wing of the Republican party and was elected governor by a combination of liberal Republicans and Democrats. Cornell's course in that campaign was unsatisfactory to both elements of the Republican party and a demand went up for a new orthodox paper of that faith. If we are not mistaken, Cornell moved his newspaper plant to some point in Kansas in the spring of 1871, and the present Maryville Republican came to take the Journal's place. We remember distinctly that a sort of ratification meeting was held on the public square several nights after the election. Among the speakers were B. K. Davis, M. G. Roseberry, Andrew Royal, A. P. Morehouse, Lafe Dawson and others whose names we can not recall. Cornell was called for, but he refused to speak. As he passed along the street about a dozen small boys, who had been inspired by older heads, followed and jibed and jeered him, occasionally catching hold of his coat tails and giving them a jerk. This enraged Cornell greatly and frequently he turned on his tormentors and kicked and struck at them viciously, but the kids always managed to get out of his reach. To escape the boys he finally went into his office, which was then on the second flood of the building on the southwest corner of the square, west side, and locked the door. Some of the old residents of Maryville will probably remember the circumstance when it is called to their mind.

Wyman, Sherburne and Kaltenbach testified, that to the best of their knowledge and belief was strychnine.

The following facts as to the manner in which Mr. Cottrill met his death, was [sic] given us by Robert H. Coffer, who accompanied the remains to this city.

He was in charge of a night drill train, these drills being run by compressed air, the train consisted of about ten flat cars, an air compressor, and engine and train crew. They went to work as usual Thursday evening at 7:30 on what is called track No. 1 of the Harlem road, a four track road, and a depression built with heavy retaining walls, and the train was drilling holes in these retaining walls for the construction part of the electric system. After starting the men to work and getting things in good shape, Cottrill got off of his train and crossed the tracks and sat down on track No. 4. A heavy freight going from New York on track 4 caused him to move, and he walked nearer his work train and sat down on track No. 2. Now as track No. 1 was occupied by this work train for the whole night, this caused all trains bound for New York to run on track No. 2, and then were running about two minutes apart and about sixty miles per hour. It is supposed the noise of the passing freight, combined with the noise of the air drills running, drowned the noise of the express train; also the light of the work train blinded the headlight from the engine, and it struck him just as he raised to escape.

'I wish to express my deepest regret and sympathies to the family, this for all his near and dear friends and acquaintances in New York City. We all realize that we lost an honest, upright young man who to know was to love, but the good die young, and we must bow to the inevitable.'

With advancing years, however, his sight and hearing became so bad, and he finally got so he could not get around.

Mr. Cox had three children, two sons, Yates and Benona, and a daughter, Miss Dora [sic] Cox. The latter lived with him and kept house for him until he died.

During his life the old gentleman succeeded in getting together considering property, but had given much of it to his children, all of whom he was able to give good starts in the world.

'Uncle' Isaac's memory of events in the early part of his life became wonderfully clear during his later years, and he got great pleasure out of talking over the incidents of his early childhood. He was able to remember distinctly the war of 1812, and related interesting stories connected with it.

Mr. Cox was an agent for picture frames and was standing on the track about a hundred yards from the station at Nodaway watching a freight switching and it is supposed that the noise of the freight train drowned out the noise of the approaching 5 o'clock passenger train on the main line on which he was standing. There were many bystanders who say that he saw the train just before it struck him but not soon enough to get off. He weighed about 225 pounds and his body was hurled in the air as high as the smokestack and his neck was broken and only a few bruises.

There were four physicians on the passenger which stopped and then pronounced him dead and Dr. R. R. Kelley, the Coroner, was called and an inquest was not necessary as there were so many witnesses.

He has three sons at Hopkins where his home is and there the funeral will take place today. He was about 45 years old.

He was prominent in local politics, having been a candidate for assessor on the Republican ticket in 1893, and for two years was a deputy constable of Washington township under George B. Nixon. During the past two years he has been in the real estate business, his office being at 206 North Fifth street.

Mr. Coy was also prominent in society circles, being a member of Chester Harding post, G. A. R.; King Hill lodge, I. O. O. F., and Logan tribe No. 21, I. O. R. M.

The funeral will take place this afternoon and will be conducted by the societies of which Mr. Coy was a member. Interment will be in Mt. Mora.

A wife and two sons survive Mr. Coy. Rufus Coy, receiving telling of the Tootle, Lemon & Co. bank, and W. [sic] H. Coy of Tootle, Wheeler & Co., are sons of the deceased.

The funeral of Mr. Coy will leave the home of the deceased at 2 p.m. and the services will be held at the Christian church at Tenth and Edmond streets, of which Mr. Coy had been a member for years. Rev. Dr. Chilton will conduct the services.
